



Background - The primary school sport premium investment goes direct to primary school Head Teachers and is designed to support improvements in the quality and depth of PE and school sport. In 2021/22 the amount schools receive each year has doubled.

Key Indicators - The Department for Education vision is that all pupils leaving primary school are physically literate and have the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport. The objective is to achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE and sport that delivers high quality provision of a balanced and holistic PE and school sport offer. There are 5 key indicators that schools should expect to see improvement across:

- 1. the engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity the Chief Medical Officer guidelines recommend that all children and young people aged 5 to 18 engage in at least 60 minutes of physical activity a day, of which 30 minutes should be in school
- 2. the profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement
- 3. increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
- 4. broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
- 5. increased participation in competitive sport

Funding - Individual schools will receive circa £16000-18000 per annum (depending on the number of pupils) which they can use to support these outcomes through various options including; staff CPD, employing specialists to work alongside teachers, cluster work with other schools and partnerships, transport, equipment, hall and pool hire etc.

From September 2013, Ofsted inspectors will assess and report on how effectively this new funding is being used when making the judgement on the quality of the school's leadership and management.

Tag rugby increased the participation levels of less active children and increased enjoyment of sport.	Future actions School is looking into alternative clubs that we can offer to broaden the provision. This will include the possibility of more paid clubs to support this. We would also look to link this to any visit sports coaches that come into school through our community links. Cornish Pirates will deliver 6 weeks of curriculum coaching in the Autumn term to build interest and skills within this sport.

Year 4 11 x 1 hour £50 per hour based on 30 children = £550	IMPACT: Non-swimmers We have become aware that a substantial proportion of our vulnerable pupils are represented in our 'pupils who need top up swimming tuition'. As a result of this focus on vulnerable groups, this subgroup of children have become more confident in the water. They have developed simple strokes and have begun to swim independently. This has increased their self confidence both in and out of the water and because of the impact we have seen on their participation and self confidence this is something we will definitely repeat. This has been an invaluable provision. We have handpicked a specific swimming teacher to support these children and that has proven to be hugely effective.	If possible we will introduce swimming into Year 5 and 6 for any children who are lacking in water confidence and unable to swim 25m. This would help to ensure that all children can swim 25m before leaving school.
